Uganda Prisons Service has successfully recaptured three (3) prisoners who had escaped from UG. Prison Mityana on December 6th, 2023. Great thanks go to all those who participated in the re-arrest of the culprits.

The recaptured prisoners are:

A Brend

- Mfitumukiza Francis, 24 years old, from Rubange village, Murora sub-county, Kisoro district, was initially charged with murder and aggravated robbery.
- Nasasira Gideon, 37 years old, from Muko village, Muko sub-county, Rubanda district. His original charges include aggravated robbery.
- Hakiza Joseph, 27 years old, from Nyarubuye village, Katobo parish,
 Nyarubuye sub-county, Kisoro district. He was charged with aggravated defilement.

The recaptured prisoners will be further charged for escape.




Figure 1: Composition of Prisons population




Figure 3: Monthly composition trends of convicts, remands, and debtors

NAM AND G77 SUMMITS, JANUARY 2024: UPS CONTRIBUTION AND NATIONAL GAINS



he Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) and Group of 77 (G77) summits held in Kampala, Uganda, witnessed extraordinary contributions from Uganda Prisons Service (UPS), highlighting its commitment to ensuring the success of the high-profile diplomatic events.

The Non-Aligned Movement (NAM) and the Group of 77 (G77) are both international organizations that emerged during the Cold War, primarily in the context of global politics and development.

Non-Aligned Movement (NAM):

The Non-Aligned Movement is a group of states that are not formally aligned with or against any major power bloc. It originated during the Cold. War as a response to the ideological and political polarization between the Western bloc, led by the United States, and the Eastern bloc, led by the Soviet Union. The founding principles of NAM include the promotion of peace, independence, and non-interference in the internal affairs of other nations.

The movement seeks to provide a platform for its member countries to pursue their own policies: without aligning with any major power. The idea is



to maintain independence and sovereignty while promoting cooperation on common issues. Members of the Non-Aligned Movement come from various regions and political systems.

Group of 77 (G77):

The Group of 77 is a coalition of developing nations, originally founded in 1964 by 77 member countries, hence the name. The group's primary focus is an promoting economic cooperation and development among its member states. Over time, the membership of the G77 has expanded, and it currently includes more than 130 member countries from Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East.

The G77 provides a forum for developing

countries to coordinate and articulate their positions on economic and development issues within international organizations, particularly the United Nations. The group advocates for the interests of developing nations in areas such as trade, finance, technology transfer, and sustainable development.

The UPS played a multifaceted role, with its involvement extending beyond the conventional responsibilities associated with the institution's mandate. From ensuring protocol and security to showcasing their manufacturing might, Uganda Prisons Service emerged as an indispensable ally in making the summits a resounding success.



Exemplary Protocol Services:

The UPS went above and beyond in extending protocol services, showcasing a warm and welcoming spirit. Delegates arriving at Entebbe international Airport were greeted by UPS personnel, and their departure was equally dignified with the same courtesy. 


















UGANDA CELEBRATES 38TH NRM LIBERATION ANNIVERSARY IN JINJA CITY





IDEOLOGY AS A BACK BONE TO MINDSET CHANGE IN SECURITY FORCES



he Advanced Joint Senior Political
Education and Leadership Development
Course (AJSPELDC) concluded on
December 20th 2023 at National
Leadership Institute (NALI), Kyankwanzi District,
marking the pass-out ceremony of 70 Uganda
Peoples Defence Forces afficers, 26 Uganda Police
Force officers, 15 Uganda Prisons Service officers,
and 20 External Security Organisation officers.

The closing ceremony, officiated by the Deputy CDF Lt. Gen Peter Elwolu, highlighted the critical role this course plays in shaping the country's leadership and addressing ideological deficiences. When the leadership development courses were initiated, a primary concern was the prevailing negative attitudes among Ugandans towards themselves, their country, and work. Recognizing these issues as ideological deficiencies, a comprehensive syllobus was developed to reament individuals and instill a renewed sense of pride and responsibility.

The course covered a broad spectrum of topics, including Ideology & Leadership Philosophy, Political Economy, Thinking as a tool to reality, Social Systems, Pre, Post, and Colonial History of Uganda, Struggle for Independence, Liganda's and Africa's battlenecks, Basics of Intelligence, Globalization, Financial Literacy, HIV/AIDS, Understanding Uganda's Geography, Inter-Torces cooperation, and Lugha ya Kiswahili, among others:



Significance of the course:






n Monday January 15th, 2024, Mr. Hillary Bisanga, Assistant Commissioner General of Prisons (Director Human Resource) delivered a lecture on







THE INSPIRATIONAL JOURNEY OF A RETIRED PRISONS OFFICER



r. Ejon Robinson, Retired Principal Officer I, spent decades navigating a carear within Uganda Prisons Service. From starting as a guard on general duties a) Murchison Bay Prison in 1990 to specializing in electrical work at Upper Prison, Luzira and innovating with the establishment of a camine unit/dog section for security purposes.

Mr. Ejon's journey was marked by dedication and inventive thinking. Upon retiring from service in 2021 at UG. Prison Lira Main, he seamlessly transitioned to a diverse life—blending his electrical skills with commercial agriculture, family growth and gainful dog training, creating a community-focused eco-tourism center.

His story showcases resilience and adaptability, illustrating a path beyond the prison environment, where skills acquired in service continued to benefit both himself and the community around him.

A Path Of Devotion And Adversity

The retired prison officer, Mr. Ejon Robinson, sat comfortably in his modest home located in Amach Sub-county in Lira District not so far Lira City Council, reflecting on a career that had spanned decades within Uganda Prisons Service. With a deep voice that carried the weight of experience and a heart filled with pride for the work he had done, he shared his journey.

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His career took him to different prisons, where he worked tirelessly to maintain equipment like boilers critical for daily kitchen operations at Murchison Bay Prison and proceeded to Upper Prison, Luzira for the same mission.



But amidst the challenges of Prison life as a young officer, Ejon found moments of joy and fulfillment. He proudly recalled his promotion to Corporal Warder, a moment that felt like a milestone in his career. Beyond personal achievements, he highlighted instances where Uganda Prisons Service supported him, notably during his wedding, showing the human side of an institution often shrouded in misconceptions.

One of Ejon's most significant contributions was pioneering the formation of a dog section within Uganda's Prisons System. He passionately spoke about the importance of these dogs, not just as guards only but also as a means to control riots, explosive detections and track escapees. Despite his vision for expanding and decentralizing the dog section, he lamented its limited growth due to financial constraints.

His long lasting impact on inmates went beyond his duties. He involved them in electrical work, allowing some to assist and learn from him. Some of the inmates, particularly passionate, received support for a certification course in Kampala even after their release which remains a testament to his influence on those he encountered during his service.

As retirement approached, Mr. Ejon's spirit remained undeterred. He seamlessly transitioned into a multifaceted life, combining his skills as an electrician with agricultural pursuits. Training dogs for home security and guard duties became another stream of income, a skill honed from his prison training that he now offered to the community.

In collaboration with his local community, Mr. Ejon established an Eco-tourism center, exhibiting a diverse array of domestic birds and animals ranging from Turkeys, Geese, Guinea Fowls, Chickens, Ducks, and Pigeons to Donkeys, Dogs, Cattle, Goats, Sheep, and beyond. This innovative venture became a magnet for visitors from schools and government institutions, keen on understanding and mirroring the project as a core component of a fresh curriculum development initiative.





These micro-projects served as educational hubs, inspiring others to delve into similar endeavors. They aimed to share knowledge, affering a blueprint for those interested in creating their projects. Ejon and his team welcomed visitors, sharing insights, and fostering a culture of learning and development within the community. Their project wasn't just about their own success; it was about empowering others to create similar opportunities.

Certainly! Mr. Ejan Robinson's success story is deeply intertwined with the supportive frameworks provided by SACCO (Savings and Credit Cooperative) and the benefits of duty-free opportunities. SACO's system enabled him and other junior staff members to save from their salaries, providing a solid financial foundation. Through SACO, he found it easier to access funds for various purposes, including building his house.

The duty-free benefits derived from their SACO contributions immensely eased the financial strain of constructing a home. This support structure stands in contrast to the difficulties many face after retirement, where they lack a stable home despite years of service. For Ejan, SACO and the duty-free benefits became instrumental in not only owning a home but also ensuring a sense of financial security for his future after retiring from service.



Mr. Gon shared advices rooted in his career journey. He urged junior officers to embrace determination and hard work, emphasizing the importance of commitment not just for personal gain but also for the betterment of their nation. He cautioned against straying from the right path and highlighted the need for dedication, likening success to building a home—it requires steadfast effort regardless of the field. His words echo a call for diligence, compassion, and a sense of responsibility towards personal aspirations and the nation's progress.



A TALE of Unity and Resilience

Mr. Ejan Robinson reflected on a career spanning three decades in Uganda's correctional facilities, his reminiscences merged with his wife's support. For 30 years, she stood by him, weathering financial hardships and finding ways to supplement their income, even browing local alcohol.




Mr. Komakech urged current afficers to value their communities, advising against getting too

INMATES CELEBRATE ACADEMIC TRIUMPHS **IN 2023 PLE RESULTS**



nmates across Uganda Prisons are revoling in their academic achievements as the results for the 2023 Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) were released by the Uganda National Examination Board: 90% of the candidates successfully qualified for Ordinary Level Education, marking a momentous triumph for prison education greater success as the candidates progress to the programs.

At Upper Prison Immate School, two candidates achieved Division I, 32 secured Division II, 15 attained Division III, and 6 embraced Division IV. The highest scorer garnered an impressive aggregate of closely followed by outstanding performances with aggregates of 12 and 13, among others. A total of 69 candidates were registered for the examinations.

Similarly, Mbarara Prison Inmate School saw seven candidates attain Division I, 22 excel in Division II, and 5 and 4 candidates respectively in Divisions (II and IV. The school had a total of 40) registered candidates who defied the odds to make their mark in the academic realm

Soroti Prison had 1 candidate achieving Division I and 8 candidates securing Division III. Nakasangola Prison also contributed to the nationwide celebration with I candidate clinching Division I, 4 achieving Division II, and 2 and 1 candidates respectively in Divisions III and IV.

Mr. Gilbert Nuwamanya, the Head Teacher of Upper Prison Immates Schools, expressed commendation for the PLE candidates, applicating their discipline, commitment, and hard work throughout the year 2023. He expressed optimism that these achievements would serve as a foundation for even next level of their education.


Candidates who sat for the examinations wore smiles that painted a canvas of excitement and satisfaction on their faces.







Prison officers who conduct themselves professionally become less of a larget for manipulation. Consider the situation where a prison officer neglects to shine his boots. This by inmates as a sign of complacency, a lackadainical attitude or a disregard for the rules and standards of the institution. Small signs of staff complacency will encourage inmates to test other boundaries, leading to a potential ascalation in risk

Conversely, officers present themselves professionally communicate message of authority, respect for the job, and adherence to standards. This fasters a climate of discipline, reducing the likelihood of inmates explaiting perceived weaknesses.

In your interactions with inmate, the earlier you can project your professionalism, the sponer inmotes will give up on the notion that you will let bad behavior slide. The earliest. interaction you have with any inmate is the visual presentation you make when you walk into the prison at the start of your shift. You want an inmate to look at you and make that initial assessment in his flead, saying,

"Oh, never mind, if I try this today, if will be too much work."

You can stop or slow down a series of behaviors from the immates in your area of responsibility by setting a lone of high expectations early.


